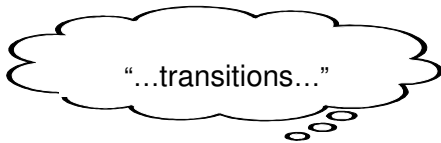
H. D. Thoreau – A Wild and Crazy Guy?

Reflections

Rev. Paul Beedle



As I write this, the terms of my new contract are still under negotiation, but we are very close to having a proposed contract for the Board to consider. Your Board has put much careful thought into what the congregation's priorities and needs are for the coming year. The basis of all our planning and negotiating is the discernment you did together in April, that next year Thoreau will focus on reaching out to let our neighbors know there is a liberal religious home for them in Fort Bend County, and when they come to visit we will be what we say we are so that they can experience what it means to exemplify our faith. Lifespan faith development programs will be the main vehicle for this mission.

I want to repeat what I wrote in this space last month: this is excellent discernment, foremost because it gets to the heart of why churches exist at all. A church is an institution that is meant to produce people who exemplify the faith. This mission for the coming year is a resounding affirmation of the founding mission of Thoreau and of the worthiness of this faith.

In only a few months, you will be undertaking this mission with only one regular staff member – your Director of Faith Development, Patti Withers. That's the right staff person to retain for this mission, and in Patti you have a DFD of great wisdom and experience. Following her guidance, you will do well.

Meanwhile, we have a few months to prepare for the transition to mostly lay leadership. The leadership retreat on June 19-20 will focus on how to sustain the quality of the Sunday Experience at Thoreau in the coming year. That's the right focus for next year's mission. The retreat will get us off to a good start in preparing lay leadership for new responsibilities.

There will be enough time to be prepared. Be not afraid. All will be well. Engage with the work. Be present. And take time to rest and play this summer.

As in any transition, while new plans are made, old plans carry on and commitments are honored. Our delegates and I will attend the Unitarian Universalist Association's General Assembly in Salt Lake City (June 24-28). I will take my vacation as planned, from the end of General Assembly through July 14. I will be back in Thoreau's pulpit on July 19, and will be a guest in the pulpit at Bay Area UU the following week, as sabbatical coverage for their minister, Rev. Matt Tittle.

You might have seen the World War II era "We Can Do It" image on display in the community room. Believe it. Thoreau is called to a much-needed ministry in Fort Bend County. This financial crisis is an opportunity to go deeper in that ministry, to own it more fully as a congregation – and as people with personal ministries in the world – than ever before. Keep asking, "what does the world need from Thoreau?" And know that whatever it is, you can do it.

Let's Go Camping

For more than 30 years, each spring and fall, Bay Area UU has had a church campout at a state park. Thoreau has been invited for the September 27 weekend campout.

An organizer reserves the sites (one site usually serves 1-3 families). Each site has a water spigot, electrical outlet, fire pit and picnic table. Last time, site fees worked out to \$8/adult for the weekend, plus a small entrance fee. Most people camp in tents; some bring RVs. People bring their own food for the weekend and cook on their propane stoves. There is a joint potluck supper on Saturday night. Bathrooms situated near the campsites have flush toilets and hot showers.

People bring firewood or purchase it from the park store. The state parks say 'no open display of alcohol,' meaning wine in cups is OK, but bottles stay in bags. There are no planned, organized activities, but people bike, hike, fish, boat, swim, hang out, drink lots of coffee, and talk.

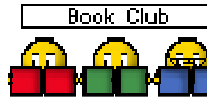

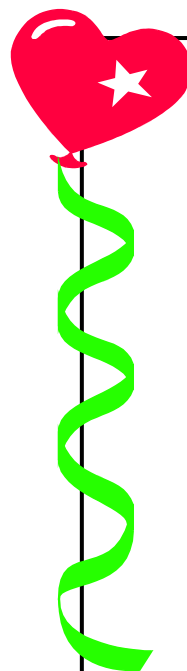

President's Report

At the annual meeting held May 17, I promised to share details of this year's accomplishments. At the time I submit this article we are working to complete and publish the annual report. I would like to share with you some of the highlights of this year's work by the board of trustees:

- We conducted a congregational assessment to clarify issues and address concerns. At the Leadership Retreat in June, the congregation and the minister agreed to continue to work together and support each other in the important work of building a UU community in Fort Bend County.
- We held a Tune-Up Workshop in August to clarify lay and professional responsibilities, and their interdependence.
- We approved the hiring of a credentialed Masters level Director of Faith Development who could strengthen our Faith Development program and recruit, train, and support volunteers.
- We reconstituted the Committee on Ministry, as called for in the assessment conducted before the leadership retreat.
- The Board reached an agreement to remove the liens placed by the contractor on our property and terminate any possible future legal claims with or by the contractor and architect.
- Because the energy and the volunteers were not forthcoming in the first half of the year, and in order to alleviate a budget deficit, we conducted a successful Service Auction in May.
- We authorized the Way Forward Committee to investigate the viability of issuing "church bonds" and, when that option was found to be unworkable, to pursue outside investors to help alleviate the impact of the interest of the Brand Lane mortgage on the operating budget.
- We worked from a "living plan" that reduced the budgeted expenses for this year as soon as it became apparent that we would develop a deficit due to income shortfalls this year.
- When it became apparent that the cost of ministry would need to be reduced by 50%, and following an invitation by Rev. Paul, we appointed a "negotiating team" to explore reaching a new half-time agreement with the minister that would bring his ministry at Thoreau to an orderly and dignified completion.

In addition, the congregation made considerable progress toward the goals identified at the leadership retreat and in the congregational assessment. A chart showing that progress in detail will be included in the annual report.

This year I learned much and enjoyed the support of many talented and committed leaders and congregants, for which I will be always grateful. In turn, I look to the incoming leaders with trust and offer them my total support in their leadership roles. Betty Johnson, as past President, has offered her invaluable expertise, energy, dedication, and friendship to me during this year.

I want to express my gratitude to each and every member of the board for their support and commitment to this liberal religious community in Fort Bend County. Thank you as well to the many members and elders of the congregation who graced me with their friendship, advice, concern, and care.

- New chairs and members are needed for the Worship, Cares & Concerns, Finance and Publicity committees.
- A fundraising arrangement with Amazon.com is pending.

Board Meeting Highlights

Excerpted from the minutes recorded by Ron Masters

- Joe Sullivan and Bob Warren have met with Leonora Montgomery. In order to solicit funding from her and from other benefactors, they request that we develop a 3-5 year plan in the next three weeks. A "new ministry model" would provide for membership growth and a return to financial self-sufficiency, and would request money to cover the cost of the Brand Lane loan, perhaps also ministerial services, and include a repayment schedule. The model expects self-sufficiency five years after the arrival of a new minister.
- The leadership retreat is scheduled for June 19-20.
- The Negotiating Team has provided a proposal to Rev. Paul, but not to the Board. A motion that "Any new ministerial contract must be approved by the Board" passed. We expect that the negotiations will not take a very long time.
- The UUA General Assembly takes place June 24-28 in Salt Lake City. A motion that "The Board supports free, informed votes by delegates Joe Sullivan, Michael Crouch, and Alicia Zubay" passed.
- Departing Administrator Norma Gonzales has drawn up a list of duties. Volunteers need to make appointments to debrief her. Financial tasks have been delegated to the Treasurer. Darlene Thompson volunteered to handle mail, email and phone messages. We need volunteers to type and copy the Orders of Service, maintain files, handle the copier contract, and order supplies.

SWUUSI Camp August 2-7

SWUUSI is an annual week-long, multi-generational summer camp (SWUUSI is the Southwest UU district Summer Institute). The camp will be held August 2-7. In years past, it has been held at Lake Texoma Resort and at Lake Murray Resort. This year it's moving to the Western Hills Guest Ranch near Tahlequah, OK. This year's theme is "The Way to Peace is Through Us." SWUUSI has programming for children, youth, young adults, and adults. Kids in Fort Bend and Lamar districts are out of school starting Thursday June 4, and Houston ISD students finished last week. With school on many people's minds, Joanie Havlick collected the following school day memories.

Irv Smith: Jim Jung gave a talk about a large tarantula he had caught and brought to class in a mason jar.
